REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS

The Directors present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2016. The Directors have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by other Charities" (FRS 102) in preparing the annual report and financial statement of the charity.

CONSTITUTION

Action Mental Health (AMH) is a company limited by guarantee, registered under NI005568, governed by the Articles of Association. The company is recognised as a charity and is registered under NIC100753 and is recognised as a charity by HM Revenue & Customs under reference number XN 47959.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Board is comprised of up to 15 Directors as set out in the charity's Articles of Association. Directors may serve for a maximum of 3 terms of 4 years, save for Serving Directors who, having served 15 years, must be re-appointed on an annual basis. Directors are recruited to the Board through an open recruitment and selection process, although 4 Directors may be co-opted annually. The working of the Board is guided by the Governance Manual, which includes an induction programme for Directors, Terms of Reference for Committees and roles and responsibilities of office bearers.

Decisions on strategy, policy and material capital expenditure are taken by the full Board and the Board ensures the Strategic Plan guides the Executive over a three year time span. Day to day decision making is under the supervision of the Chief Executive Officer, Mr D Babington with regular reporting to the Finance Committee, Audit and Risk Committee, Nominations and Remuneration Committee, Development Committee and the Board. The Chief Executive Officer directly manages the Senior Management Team who ensures targets in the annual Operational Plan are being met.

In line with corporate good practice the company has an Audit and Risk Committee comprising of two independent and three Board members; the Chief Executive Officer and Head of Business Support also attend with the external auditors present when appropriate (usually three meetings a year). Each year a Directors' Conference is held to assess progress. The charity has been formally registered with the Charities Commission for Northern Ireland since February 2015.

Over the year the Board met 6 times; the Finance Committee held 6 meetings, the Audit and Risk Committee met on 4 occasions, the Nominations and Remuneration Committee 3 times and the Development Committee once. Throughout the year a number of audits from DEL, DETI, ETI and others provided reassurance to the Board.

The Nominations and Remuneration Committee review pay levels for all staff on an annual basis and benchmark them against National Joint Council (NJC) scales and their approach to pay and the annual Accounts are available on the website; the Committee seeks approval from the full Board for any increases in staff salaries. In 2014 the Committee commissioned an extensive independent review of all staff salaries which benchmarked them against other locally based charities, sectors and NJC scales and the recommendations have been implemented in full. In respect of the Chief Executive the Committee benchmarks salary against ACEVO and NICVA guidance.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS (Continued)

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT (Continued)

In order to provide effective services AMH works in a number of partnerships with other charities in Northern Ireland. The Together For You consortium of 9 charities, funded by the Big Lottery Fund and led by AMH, delivered its third and final year of mental health and emotional resilience building interventions across the region, engaging with over 16,000 people across NI. The SES consortium, co-led by AMH and Cedar, met all targets for DEL's Work Connect and Workable employment programmes and continued to out-perform comparable programmes in GB. AMH contributes to a range of other partnerships such as the Long Term Conditions Alliance Northern Ireland through staff members holding appointments on Committees.

DIRECTORS

The Directors of the charity are its trustees for the purposes of charity law. The Directors who served the charity during the year are as noted on Page 1.

Mrs S E Hillan, Ms P Hunter (until Feb 16) and Messrs. Fee, Kohner, McKeever, McMurray, Mowbray, Thompson, Barr, Fitzsimmons, McKeown, O'Neill and Pollard (until Jan 16) all served throughout the year.

A register of Directors' interests is maintained, with regular review and update, in order for the Board to be aware of any potential conflicts of interest; the issue of potential conflicts is a standing agenda item at the start of all Board meetings. None of the Directors had any material interest in contracts with the charity during the year.

RISK STRATEGY

A risk register is maintained in relation to all material risks posing a financial threat to the charity. This register is reviewed regularly by the Audit and Risk Committee and Board meetings to ensure systems and procedures are established to mitigate those risks identified and to minimise any potential impact on the charity.

In managing the Reserves the Board is guided by their Investment Policy and its objective is to generate a return in excess of inflation over the long term whilst generating an income which could be available to support existing services and new projects. A diversified spread of investments is maintained and investment providers are required to meet with the Finance Committee once a year to discuss performance, risk and adherence to the Investment Policy's ethical criteria.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS (Continued)

PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The year was dominated by uncertainty with ESF funding which impeded all ESF provider organisations from delivering outcomes as planned; after high level political intervention funding became more stable and the programme continues to deliver outcomes for clients. Nearly all other funding sources were under pressure and the Board prepared contingency measures, including securing an overdraft facility which was never actually triggered.

Allied to funding pressures in the public sector there were projects coming to their natural end which resulted in unusually high staff turnover. The Board, particularly the Nominations and Remuneration Committee, closely monitored the issue and ensured measures were put in place to alleviate pressures and support staff, all of which they keep under careful scrutiny.

Other key risks and uncertainties affecting the charity are set out below:

Reputational

The major reputational risk for the charity is a loss of trust with beneficiaries, funders or the public.

Financial

The major financial risks that the charity faces are the possible termination of funding from other bodies, the future of contracts and fluctuations in investments.

The Referendum vote in June to leave the EU puts into doubt a significant proportion of existing AMH funding from the European Social Fund, details are very unclear and likely to remain so for some time.

Legal and governance

The major legal and governance risks for the charity are, to act in a breach of trust, acting outside of regulatory or other good governance requirements and conflicts of interest.

The charity recognises the above risks and uncertainties and operates so as to minimise the threat posed to the charity by adhering to the highest procedures and standards and working closely with key funders.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

AMH is a voluntary organisation which supports people's mental health and well-being through vocational training, supported employment options, personal development, health and well-being programmes and resilience building. AMH's Objects are;

- To provide assistance for those affected by mental ill health and other disabilities with a range of supports to improve their well-being and help them recover and return to purposeful activity such as employment; this includes helping them gain and develop new skills;
- To promote awareness of mental health issues to the public at large, and;
- To promoting greater sustainability through more efficient use of resources.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS (Continued)

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES (Continued)

The majority of AMH effort is expended in supporting people's recovery from mental ill health with a keen focus on employment as a means to aid that recovery. Over 65% of AMH staff work on the New Horizons recovery programme funded by the EU through ESF funding which amounted to £1,871,810 in this last year. Clients are referred to services from the 5 Health and Social Care Trusts and move on after a 3 year programme to employment or a more sustainable independent life. Each client has a tailored action plan and activities are very varied including essential skills, retail skills, personal development, IT, catering and job search. AMH measures a range of outcomes, such as individuals gaining employment or moving on to Further Education, which are reported to Trusts and the EU.

Aside from the New Horizons services AMH also delivers further recovery programmes through Government employment programmes such as Workable and Work Connect. These 2 programmes are delivered with 6 other charity partners as part of Supported Employment Solutions and they provide very individual interventions to assist clients to get into work or to remain in work. DEL sets targets and measures outcomes of these programmes on a regular basis. AMH also runs small alcohol addiction projects, the Vision project (Autistic Spectrum Disorder) in the Southern Trust area and the Promote project (Learning Disability) in the South Eastern Trust area all with smaller numbers of clients which are funded by the Big Lottery and Health Trusts.

In terms of raising awareness and improving well-being AMH established the MensSana project 12 years ago to promote awareness of mental health issues with young people and this work has expanded through the Mindset project to include adults and the Protect Life service to deliver suicide/self harm prevention services. These projects and contracts are funded by the Southern Trust, the PHA, Big Lottery Fund and by corporate donors/Foundations; some of the work takes place in HMPs Hydebank and Maghaberry with young offenders. The charity also operates three Men's Sheds funded by the Big Lottery and they support men aged 60+ to share skills, socialise and connect with their wider community. This range of activities assists AMH in achieving its purpose of promoting mental health issues to the public.

AMH has also spoken out and provided a leadership role by raising the issue of mental health with the public through the launch of research by QUB. The research launch in October culminated in Northern Ireland's first ever Mental Health Summit in February with the aim of ensuring mental health was a political priority at Stormont. AMH also ran a campaign of '12 Christmas Wishes' featuring politicians and local personalities to again raise the priority of mental health, particularly in view of the financially demanding backdrop. There was widespread coverage for all these events and social media reach with the public was extensive.

AMH has undertaken a rolling programme of refurbishment to upgrade the 6 owned sites and to make them more efficient. A substantial sum has been committed this year by the Board to make them more sustainable and this, allied to better use of technology, particularly use of mobile devices, is contributing to AMH working more efficiently and in a more sustainable way.

More information on AMH's work and achievements during 2015/16 is in the Annual Review which is available from the Company's Registered Office and on its website.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS (Continued)

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

This was the third and final year of the Board's Strategic Plan 2013-2016 and most of the key objectives have been achieved. The year was yet again dominated by public funding pressures but AMH maintained income at expected levels. There were particular pressures with securing ESF funding through DEL and this led to the late start to the ESF programme.

During the year 2154 clients with mental health needs and/or a learning disability attended services provided by AMH including New Horizons, Promote, Workable and Work Connect. The New Horizons services provided training and employability programmes to 1781 clients. Clients achieved 3514 accredited training outcomes and 184 progressed to paid employment, voluntary work, further training or other government programmes. AMH continues to be the only organisation in Northern Ireland to deliver the Individual Placement and Support (IPS) service, currently in the Belfast Trust area.

AMH also continues to run the Long Term Conditions Alliance (NI) project 'Managing the Challenge' in the Western Trust area and 25 programmes were successfully provided throughout the year with 260 people participating in the self-management programme. Our MensSana, Mindset and Protect Life programmes offered a range of mental health promotion and suicide and self-harm interventions across Northern Ireland; there were 15907 direct beneficiaries. 251 older men have attended the 3 Men's Sheds since commencement.

In terms of Government Employment Programmes, the SES consortium delivered Work Connect and Workable (NI) across the region: through the Workable contract AMH supported 113 clients and through Work Connect, 184 clients were supported by AMH with 42 gaining employment during 2015/16. AMH Works, our training consultancy, continued to provide well-being training for 21 companies and held 2 employer conferences in Belfast and L'Derry.

In terms of the estate there were some modest changes due to ESF funding, so for example AMH withdrew a permanent presence in Bangor which will now be achieved through outreach. Refurbishment work was completed in Downpatrick and plans are in place for Fermanagh and further work in Ards. The site in Duncrue Industrial Estate in Belfast was sold.

AMH saw staff voluntary turnover in the year 2015-16 of 14.2%, with 43.5% of voluntary leavers having been on fixed term contracts and seeking alternative employment. The Equality Commission audit of 6th February 2016 records AMH staffing complement of 167 employees: 50 males and 117 females.

Craigavon New Horizons, Fermanagh New Horizons and Promote all retained 100% compliance on their Customer Service Excellence (CSE) heath checks again this year. AMH continues to be recognised as Investors in People (IIP) Gold and IIP Champion organisation and will be applying for reassessment under the IIP's new standards in September 2016.

The Board had planned further Employer Forums in new locations but these have not yet materialised so this will be a target in the forthcoming Strategic Plan 2016-2019.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS (Continued)

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE (Continued)

Most of the objectives in the strategic plan were achieved and there was the notable success of meeting ESF outcomes, and in some cases over-achieving ESF outcomes, given the turmoil with the programme. Growth of fundraising and events has also been a positive development as well and will be capitalised on in coming years. The aim to establish further Employer Forums to support employment programmes did not progress due to other commitments and difficulties in finding appropriate members. Also effort to develop AMH Works further was distracted with the wider funding issues and will be rectified with more resources in the coming year.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Given the turmoil with ESF funding, which DEL publicly admitted and apologised for, AMH has emerged at the end of the year in a relatively positive and stable financial position. There were occasions when cash flow was precarious and the Board agreed to a temporary over-draft facility, which was never activated.

The ESF funding continued to support the recovery services whilst a range of PHA, Big Lottery and Trust funding supported all the other programmes. Unrestricted income is also growing through more events and active fundraising and the Board aims to increase this over time.

RESULTS

The charity had total incoming resources of £6,154,222 (2015 - £5,919,149) for the year ended 31 March 2016 and the principal sources of this funding are as disclosed in note 3 of the financial statements.

Unrealised losses on investments were £55,936 (£94,879 gain in 2015).

The overall net movement on unrestricted funds for the year was a surplus of £405,583 (2015 - £56,092). The charity spends all restricted monies that it receives and makes good any deficit on restricted funds from its general unrestricted reserves. This year's surplus also reflects the gain made on the sale of the Duncrue site and the proceeds from the on-going legal claim, now settled.

The closing balance on unrestricted reserves at 31 March 2016 was £5,246,098 (2015 - £4,840,515).

RESERVES POLICY

Due to the uncertain nature of AMH's funding, it is the Board's policy to maintain a designated risk reserve equal to six months budgeted expenditure (see note 24). The level of free reserves at the year-end (excluding designated reserves) was £1,406,643 (2015 - £685,510).

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS (Continued)

INVESTMENT POLICY AND PERFORMANCE

The Finance Committee, a Board sub-committee, oversees, monitors and advises the Board on investment decisions and they are guided by the Investment Policy.

In managing the Reserves of AMH and hence it's investments, the Board's objective is to generate a return in excess of inflation over the long term whilst generating an income and capital growth which could be available to support existing services and new projects whilst a diversified spread of investments is maintained.

Reports on performance are provided to the Board and Directors understand they are ultimately responsible for the overall management of the investments.

The Finance Committee are content that overall investment performance was acceptable and in line with investment objectives.

DIRECTORS' RESPONSIBILITIES

The Directors (who are also trustees of Action Mental Health for the purposes of Charity Law), are responsible for preparing the Report of the Directors and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently:
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The directors are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the Year Ended 31 March 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Companies Act 2006, Charity Law and UK Generally Accepted Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015.

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the inclusion of fixed asset investments at market value.

The Directors consider that there are no material uncertainties concerning the charity's ability to continue as a going concern. The charity has cash resources of £1,280,749 at the balance sheet date and have funding agreements in place for the immediate future. With respect to the reporting period 2016/17 the most significant uncertainty that affects the carrying value of assets held by the charity is the performance of investment markets.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

The charity adopted SORP (FRS 102) in the current year and an explanation of how transition to SORP (FRS 102) has affected the reported financial position and performance is given in note 31.

- (b) Revenue grants are credited to incoming resources on the earlier of when they are received or when they are receivable, unless they relate to a specified future period, in which case they are deferred.
- (c) Donations, contracted funding, income for services provided and other income are included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable.
- (d) Income from trading activities includes income earned from fundraising events and trading activities to raise funds for the charity. Income is received in exchange for supplying goods and services in order to raise funds and is recognised when entitlement has occurred.
- (e) All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Costs are categorised under the following headings:
 - Costs of raising funds includes direct costs of fundraising and investment management fees;
 - Expenditure on charitable activities includes direct costs of the rehabilitative services, the employment service and the welfare & education programme; and
 - Other expenditure represents those items not falling into the categories above.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as an expense against the activity for which expenditure arose.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the Year Ended 31 March 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(f) Support costs allocation

Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity and include project management carried out at the charity's main premises. Support costs are allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Fund-raising costs are those incurred in seeking voluntary contributions and do not include the costs of disseminating information in support of the charitable activities.

- (g) Restricted funds are to be used for specified purposes by reference to the donor. Expenditure which meets the criteria is identified and allocated to the fund, either directly or by allocating a fair proportion of overheads and other costs.
- (h) Unrestricted funds represent other incoming resources received or generated for charitable purposes, to be used at the charity's discretion. Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Directors for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.
- (i) The cost of tangible fixed assets is their purchase cost, together with any incidental costs of acquisition. Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets less residual value, in equal annual instalments on the following bases:-

Land None
Buildings 4%
Plant and machinery 20% and 16.66%
Fixtures, fittings, tools and other equipment 20% and 33.33%
Motor vehicles 25%

- (j) Grants received against capital expenditure are included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities as restricted income. Once the capital expenditure has taken place and the conditions of the grant are fulfilled, they are transferred to a designated unrestricted fund which is then reduced over the useful economic life of the asset in line with depreciation.
- (k) Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is determined on a first in first out basis. Net realisable value is the price at which the stock can be realised in the normal course of business. Provision is made for obsolescent, slow moving and defective stocks.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the Year Ended 31 March 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(I) Employee benefits

When employees have rendered service to the charity, short-term employee benefits to which the employees are entitled are recognised at the undiscounted amount expected to be paid in exchange for that service.

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme, the assets of which are held separately from those of the charity in an independently administered fund. The pension cost charge represents contributions payable to the scheme in the accounting period.

- (m) Investments are stated on the balance sheet at fair value and all movements, including realised and unrealised gains and losses, are shown in the Statement of Financial Activities. Realised gains and losses are the aggregate of the difference between sales proceeds and opening fair value (or on addition if purchased during the year). Unrealised gains and losses represent the movement in market value during the year.
- (n) As a registered charity, Action Mental Health is not liable to either Income Tax or Corporation Tax.
- (o) Assets not measured at fair value are reviewed for any indication that the asset may be impaired at each balance sheet date. If such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, or the asset's cash generating unit, is estimated and compared to the carrying amount. Where the carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount, an impairment loss is recognised in profit or loss unless the asset is carried at a revalued amount where the impairment loss is a revaluation decrease.
- (p) Rentals payable and receivable under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.
- (q) Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the Year Ended 31 March 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

(r) Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported for assets and liabilities as at the balance sheet date and the amounts reported for income and expenditure during the year. However, the nature of estimation means that actual outcomes could differ from those estimates. The following are the company's key sources of estimation uncertainty:

Tangible fixed assets - The annual depreciation charge on fixed assets depends primarily on the estimated lives of each type of asset and estimates of residual values. The directors regularly review these asset lives and change them as necessary to reflect current thinking on remaining lives in light of prospective economic utilisation and physical condition of the assets concerned. Changes in asset lives can have a significant impact on depreciation and amortisation charges for the period. Detail of the useful lives is included in the accounting policies.

Debtors - short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Impairment of such debtors involves some estimation uncertainty.

2. MEMBERS LIABILITY

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. Every member undertakes to contribute such amounts, not exceeding £10, to the charity's assets if it should be wound up whilst being a member, or within one year of ceasing to be a member.

Capital utilised fund:

26. CONTINGENT ASSETS AND LIABILITIES

A portion of grants received may become repayable if the charity fails to comply with the terms of the relevant letters of offer.

Professional fees have been incurred in connection with a claim made by the charity. Although the claim has been settled and the income reflected in these financial statements, at the date of approval it has not been possible to ascertain the quantum of fees still to be incurred by the charity with reasonable certainty. Therefore no provision has made for such fees as at 31 March 2016.

27. CONDUIT FUNDING

AMH acts as lead partner in respect of the Big Lottery Funded Together For You project. The Together For You project is aimed at delivering mental health and wellbeing services to a range of people across Northern Ireland. The Together for You partners include AMH, Aware Defeat Depression, CAUSE, CRUSE, MindWise, Nexus, PraxisCare and Relate NI.

AMH also acts as lead partner in the Northern and Southern regions within the Supported Employment Solutions (SES) consortium. SES is contracted to deliver the DEL Work Connect and Workable NI programmes across Northern Ireland. The SES partnership includes AMH, Cedar, Mencap, Orchardville, NOW, RNIB and Action on Hearing Loss.

AMH also acts as lead partner for Youth Action.

Statement of cash flows

Previous UK GAAP

Under previous UK GAAP, cash flows were presented separately for operating activities, returns on investment and servicing of finance, taxation, capital expenditure and financial investment, acquisitions and disposals, equity dividends paid and financing.

FRS 102

Under FRS 102, cash flows are required to be shown separately for three categories only, namely, operating, investing and financing. Additionally the cash flow statement reconciles to cash and cash equivalents whereas under previous UK GAAP the cash flow statement reconciled to cash. Cash and cash equivalents are defined in FRS 102 as "cash on hand and demand deposits and short term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and that are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value" whereas cash is defined in FRS 1 as "cash in hand and deposits repayable on demand with any qualifying institution, less overdrafts from any qualifying institution repayable on demand".

Impact
